

TROSTON PARISH NEWSLETTER May - June 2024

Parish Council Meeting - 7th May

Diana Bilverstone was elected as Chairman and Sue Rose was elected as Vice Chair.

Andrew Speed, our West Suffolk Councillor, confirmed funding is available to Troston enabling the purchase of a new VAS, to be ordered shortly and will be solar powered. The existing one will still be in operation charged and moved regularly by Councillors Paul Walton & Des Pugson.

Rebecca Hopfensperger, our Suffolk County Councillor, report covered a number of topics - in particular potholes and weed treatment.

- Potholes are the bane of people's lives. The bad weather this year led to a 105% increase in reports. SCC response is not always as quick or as good as we might hope. There has been a commitment by Highways, however, to improve their service not least by introducing the "dragon patcher" which fixes potholes quicker and to a higher standard, and secondly the use of the Road Mender Elastomac which can patch larger areas of the road at the same time.
- She encourages anyone to report highway defects online on the highway reporting tool. If you do not think there is any action being taken you can report it to clerk with the report number and she can escalate the matter. For emergencies you should contact 0345 606 6171.
- Weeds have been a subject which again has caused some concern.
 Troston verges will be receiving weed treatment the w/c Monday July 15th weed, but please allow +or- five working days due to weather. The regular weed treatment on our highway network will continue using a variety of methods, with plans for glyphosate being considered only when appropriate the ambition still remains to reduce the use of glyphosate as far as possible.

Graeme Norris reported on Ixworth Patients Association and will continue to report regularly on the vital services provided on a purely voluntary basis. The Parish Council will include discussion of a donation at the annual finance meeting in November.

We are grateful to have had a tree donated to the village in memory of Peter Edward Demant (26.02.41 - 24.06.22), by his wife Marian Demant, daughter Bev Cunningham and his grandsons Sam & Isaac Cunningham, of Forge

Corner. The variety is Liquid Amber, which turns a beautiful red in the Autumn, which should be a highlight in its position on the far side of the playing field.

Following advice from the Parks Infrastructure Manager the service gate to the children's play area will be padlocked.

The issue of parking within the village was again raised by a member of the public, the advice given remains the same; if a vehicle is obstructing the highway, it is a matter for the police - the Parish Council are unable to assist further.

To commemorate the 80th anniversary of D Day on June 6th it is planned the "not forgotten" silhouette soldiers will be sited in the village.

Remembering Uncle Leonard

We are about to commemorate the D Day Landings on the 6th June 1944. The largest amphibious invasion in military history that led to the liberation of Europe from the Nazi Regime.

"Of all the people who lost their lives, my uncle, Leonard Turner, was the only person from Troston who was killed. I would like us to think of him. He lived in the cottage which is now the site of 13 Church Lane.

Leonard's ship, the wooden mine-sweeper H.M.S. Gairsay, was sunk during the night by a one-man submarine off the coast of Normandy. He was just 22 years old. These German submarines were one of Hitler's "secret weapons" to stem the liberation of Europe and either carried a torpedo or a cluster of remotely controlled midget motor-boats with an explosive charge in the bow. That fateful night they sunk the destroyer "Quorn", two transport ships, a landing craft - and, near the end of the engagement, as dawn began to break, the Gairsay.

Apparently it was through the valiant efforts of the crew of the Gairsay firing light machine guns at close range, fifty-eight of the motor-boats and all the submarines were destroyed that night, before they inflicted more damage on the Allied ships.

A sad, and what must have been a very frightening end on a dark night to a brave young man - who deserves not to be forgotten."

Doreen can remember the day the dreaded telegram arrived. She was sent to fetch her grandfather who was driving the horses in the nearby fields. Her grandmother was devastated and never recovered from her grief.

Farm News

Suffolk farmers could see profits plummet after one of the wettest Springs on record. To add to their woes, commodity prices have fallen and the Basic Payment Scheme (BPS) - which has helped many stay in the black up until now - is ending. With diminishing amounts of the farm subsidy to sustain them through the highs and lows of the weather and prices, they are facing a tricky year.

Indeed, a raft of new legislation is coming into effect on sustainability and the environment - and a looming election probably means more changes on the horizon.

According to Giles Allen, of Strutt and Parker, "Flood damage to farmland, crops, and infrastructure has caused financial strain and uncertainty for many farmers. The continuous periods of rain has disrupted farming operations - leading to delays in planting, harvesting and other essential activities."

Some are making the difficult decision to leave the industry, he said. They had already seen more farmland come to the market in the first three months of this year compared to the same period last year.

Healthy Together

People living with serious mental issues face one of the greatest health equality gaps in Suffolk. Their life expectancy is 15–20 years shorter than that for the general population - and this disparity is largely due to preventable physical illnesses.

To try to address this longstanding health inequality the NHS has commissioned the 'Healthy Together' project.

The project team are (Chloe, Sharn and Simon all of whom have personal experience of mental health issues) supported by Louise. Their job is to help people who have a serious mental illness, typically schizophrenia, bipolar disorder or any other disorder where psychosis occurs, with a physical health need. This could be an annual health check, GP appointment or hospital appointment. The support worker can accompany the patient, attend appointments with them and even give lifts where necessary.

There is a referral process. Your GP can refer - but people can self refer but consent is required from the individual concerned.
