


TROSTON PARISH NEWSLETTER July - August 2022

To Be or Not to Be?

Troston Farms have been holding consultation events with the village about their plans for the redevelopment of Lower Farm Piggery. The majority of those responding were in favour of redeveloping the site for housing - and no support for a commercial development of the piggery.



The comments favoured a mix of bungalows and family homes. Houses of a traditional design had the most support. There should be affordable housing as well as homes for rent to local people. Villagers believed the development should consider having a shop.

Walking routes were valued and the scheme could create a walking route to the north to Heath Road to the village picnic-wood, convenience store, post office, take-away meal restaurants and hairdresser; and to the south: the pub, village hall and recreation field with a young children's play area, football pitch and BMX track.

Traffic calming on the road outside the site was supported, as well as open space on the site and ecology areas which could all be delivered.

The redevelopment, however, would have to be fully supported by the Parish Council and acknowledged in the forthcoming West Suffolk Local Plan.

West Suffolk Local Plan

As we understand the situation, the current consultation by West Suffolk on approved development sites explicitly <u>excludes</u> Lower Farm Piggery because other sites are considered to be more suitable and sustainable.

"Troston is designated as a type B village with only a limited range of service and facilities. In type B villages there are no-site allocations and only small scale infill developments of five homes or less within the designated housing settlement boundary will be permitted".

This conclusion is based on the updated Sustainable Settlement Study of May'22:

- The village has no primary school or early years provision, no GP Surgery, and no Library.
- The convenience stores and Post Office are considered not to be in Troston's settlement boundary but part of RAF Honington. These facilities are not regarded as being within easy walking or cycling on secure paths for residents of Troston.
- The bus service was viewed as not providing a commutable service to residents.
- The development would mean more cars travelling through the village.
- It was believed the village hall did not offer a sufficient range of facilities and leisure activities.
- Although Ixworth might be considered as within 5 km it is categorised as a key service centre not a town.
- Replacing derelict, what some may regard as unsightly, sometimes smelly buildings is no longer regarded a reason for giving permission to develop.

We believe a fairly big gesture on the part of Troston Farms would be needed to make a serious impact on the current thinking of the planning department. For us, that gesture would be to turn the whole of the current meadow into some kind of accessible nature reserve, to be managed either by Suffolk Wildlife Trust or the Parish Council. That might just be enough to make the planning department rethink its current view?

The council although supportive of the proposed development, has reservations about the consultation process and the possibility of upgrading the category of the village to an A. Simon Brown, our West Suffolk Councillor, has agreed to seek informal discussions with colleagues in West Suffolk to ask if there are any grounds to grant an exception for the piggery site proposal.

Well, I'm not holding my breath (but may need to hold my nose?) - the village has been talking to Planning and Environmental Officers for years about the periodic smell and desired redevelopment of the piggery site. I believe the motive behind the Local Plan is to speed-up the decision making process by delegating more decisions to Local Government Officers - and so reducing the number proposals going to the (elected) Councillors' Development Committee for discussion - and their judgement on a scheme's specific merits. By simplifying decisions in advance to: are they Type A or B? Yes or No? makes the Officers' lives easier...

Spiralling Farm Costs

The government may have announced measures to help with the increased costs in its food strategy for England in June, saying it was "backing farmers" with a pledge to increase domestic food supply. Indeed, the likes of Rees-Mogg, Minister of Brexit Opportunities, may say Brexit is offering great opportunities.

Announcements and pledges, however, are just words. Spiralling costs and labour shortages over the last year are forcing farmers to contemplate significant changes, with others going out of business.

"Our costs, like everybody else's, have gone through the roof. Fertiliser this year has trebled in price, red diesel has doubled in price which is a great deal more than what road diesel has gone up".

"With the current climate, cost of living, loss of BPS [basic payment scheme] and more environmental pressure, I'd be very surprised if we didn't see more and more farmers say, 'I've had enough' - expect to see abandoned farm buildings."

Deserving Better?

The Government's much promised "levelling up" agenda is flawed. Their recent white paper is too focused on urban regions and does not properly account for the pressures facing smaller rural towns and villages - effectively ignoring 12 million people. But rural areas tend to be safe Conservative seats?

Despite being home to a fifth of the population and with a larger total population than London or the South East, when evaluating all the metrics in the white paper, England's 'hidden regions' like Suffolk have a greater need to be levelled up than any other part of the country. West Suffolk has received little extra funding.

The research by Pragmatix Advisory for the Rural Services Network, which represents rural councils, warns that the Government does not account for

disadvantage in rural economies, often linked to limited local employment prospects, poor wage levels, restricted access to further education, poor transport services, stretched GP coverage, high house prices relative to local earnings or percentage of premises with super-fast broadband.

As a retired doctor, I believe scrapping free lateral flow testing is a dangerous step. We need to keep testing and taking precautions to protect our families and vulnerable neighbours.

Many scientists and 75% of senior NHS staff don't agree with the government that the covid pandemic is all but over. Crucial data from the Office of National Statistics surveys tell us that currently in the UK around 1 in 20 people are infected and 150 die from covid-19 each day. Such high levels of infection are a recipe for new and more harmful variants to emerge.

To imagine that wishful thinking can end the pandemic is both delusional and dangerous, and puts many more lives at risk. This is not 'learning to live with covid' but learning to die with it.
